Iterative Testing What It Is <ul style="list-style-type: none">A type of usability testing that involves creating a design or wireframe, testing it with 1-3 users, changing the design, and running againWorks best to refine concepts into a designUsually around 15 users complete tasksDifferent users will likely evaluate different prototype versionsAnalysis is done after each participant When To Use <ul style="list-style-type: none">Early conceptual workDesigns are expected to change substantially as more information is gatheredDesigns are less "concrete" (wireframes, low fidelity)Working within an agile frameworkUser tasks may change between testsShorter product timelines	Standard/In-Depth Usability Testing What It Is <ul style="list-style-type: none">Deeper study of a design to understand whether it is usable by a larger and more inclusive group of usersWorks best to understand whether a more concretely defined design is usableUsually 6-10 users complete tasksAll users test the same prototype and analysis is done at the end When To Use <ul style="list-style-type: none">When validating a design before launchRe-evaluating a system after a design change is proposedEvaluating a system in its current live state to determine what changes should be made to improve it
Moderated Usability Testing When To Use <ul style="list-style-type: none">When you want the opportunity to ask follow-up questionsIf you want to ask users to perform different tasks based on how they answer certain questions	Unmoderated Usability Testing When To Use <ul style="list-style-type: none">When you don't need to be there to moderate the testingWhen you're on a shorter timelineWhen you want to collect more responses

- If you're new to usability testing, and want to practice interviewing and get more context
- If you want to take notes and start to pull out key findings during the interview
- If you'd like stakeholders and team members to participate and ask the user questions if there's time

Considerations

- Can make it harder to schedule with participants
- Takes time to schedule and attend sessions
- Need note-taker, interviewer and participant available at the same time
- Longer timeline to complete testing (usually 3-4 weeks minimum)

- If you're comfortable creating studies in UserTesting

Considerations

- Harder to ask follow-up questions
